



Introductory Clauses

Setting the Scene



An introductory clause

comes at the beginning of a sentence and gives us extra information about the main action

Key points:

- Always comes **first**
 - **While scrolling through TikTok during lunch break**, Sarah discovered her own dance video had gone viral overnight.
- Needs a **comma** after it
 - Before the big championship **game**, Marcus practiced his free throws until the gym lights automatically shut off.
- Tells us **when, where, why, or how**
 - Although she had studied for hours, Emma found herself staring at the math test with sweaty palms and a racing heart. (shows us **when**)



Examples



_____ students flooded into the hallway.

After the bell rang, students flooded into the hallway.

_____ the basketball bounced across the court.

When he missed the winning shot, the ball bounced across the court.

_____ rain poured on the windows.

Before the tornado started, rain poured on the windows.

_____ the pizza arrived at the cafeteria



While our teacher celebrated our victory in the class competition, the pizza arrived at the cafeteria.
